### THE TALK OF THE TOWN: OLD HOLLYWOOD EDITION



In response to interest expressed by some longtime members to know more about the Athenaeum staff, we will have a series of articles to let you get to know us better. Anyone who has attended an Athenaeum event, such as a concert or lecture, has probably received a friendly greeting from Lucy Peters, our Program and Box Office Associate and Mini-Concert Coordinator. Lucy has been part of the Athenaeum for a long time, having begun employment here on July 10, 1996 (and having served as a volunteer here for four years before that).

She began as an administrative assistant to former Music Director, now Jazz Coordinator, Dan Atkinson, but advanced to become Box Office Associate. She is now also the coordinator of our weekly free Mini-Concerts and is responsible for curating and finding performers for that long-standing Athenaeum

program. She says that this is her favorite part of her job—connecting with performers and organizing what is now a year-round offering at the Athenaeum.

Before Lucy came to the Athenaeum, she lived a very cosmopolitan life and has many interesting stories to tell of her experiences around the world. Thereafter, she attended the University of Washington in Seattle and studied French at the University of Grenoble in France.

Later, Lucy spent nine years on the Greek island of Mykonos, where she met and married Mexican artist Luis Orozco, painting and learning the Greek language in the process. Incidentally, it was through him that Lucy first met Erika Torri and subsequently connected with the Athenaeum after moving back to La Jolla.

When Lucy is not at work, she likes to spend time with her sons, Marcos and Drew, and her granddaughter, Audra. She gets plenty of opportunities to do this in the case of Drew, because he is an Athenaeum facility assistant and sets up all the Monday Mini-Concerts. Lucy also likes to listen to live music and take walks with Marley the dog.



### KATHI'S LIBRARY CORNER

### EVERYBODY'S TALKING ABOUT OUR ART BOOKS: NEW ADVENTURES AWAIT YOU IN OUR CIRCULATING LIBRARY STACKS



The new year has started, and the months ahead are like a clean slate lying before us, inviting us to do something we haven't done before. If you are drawn to

art, the Athenaeum has some great new books that will help you learn an artistic skill in a wide variety of areas and are appropriate for beginners.

Ikebana: The Zen Way of Flowers by Yuji Ueno (745.92/U22), provides inspiration and

techniques for creating with flowers. Full of photographs with straightforward text, this book will provide the encouragement you need to get started.

Do you want to bring new life to clothing or decorations? Japan Blue: Indigo Dyeing Techniques: A Beginner's Guide to Shibori Tie-Dyeing, by Piggy Tsujioka and Hisako Rokkaku (746.6/T882), includes easy, well-illustrated instructions to revitalize the accessories in your life.

A large number of Athenaeum members benefit from classes offered by the School of the Arts, which include many on painting. Two new books introduce the art of painting with watercolor and other media. They are Go with The Flow Painting: Step-by-Step Techniques for Spontaneous Effects in Watercolor by Ohn Mar Win (751.42/W758) and Painting Abstract Nature on Canvas: A Guide to Creating Vibrant Art with

Watercolour and Mixed Media by Jane Betteridge (751.422/B565).

Many people find collage an enjoyable way to express themselves; no special materials are usually required, and many skill levels can find satisfaction in this art form. Samuel Price's Paper Collage Workshop: A Fine Artist's Guide to Creative Collage (702.812/P946) includes instructions and suggestions for anything from a landscape to something more abstract.

Finally, if you want to be creative, but can't seem to access that part of yourself and put it into action, Rick Rubin has written a highly praised book, *The Creative Act: A Way of Being* (153.3/R896), that might be just what you need to cultivate your creative self.

As always, library staff are happy to assist you in locating these books, or anything else that you need!

On April 20, the Athenaeum Art Center will participate in Chicano Park Day by offering free printmaking activities at Chicano Park, inviting the community to partake in a celebration of culture and creativity.

Set for the weekend of March 16 and 17, 11 a.m.-4 p.m., the Athenaeum Art Center Spring Fair promises to be a gathering of local printmakers and bookstores within the AAC space and courtyard, offering free attendance and activities for all.

She has artwork in the collections of the Museum of Contemporary Art San Diego; Whitney Museum of American Art, New York; Pérez Art Museum, Miami, Florida; Los Angeles County Museum of Art; and MIT List Visual Arts Center, Cambridge,

Massachusetts.

Fu lives and works in San Diego, where she is Associate Professor of Art at the University of San Diego.

The call for entries for the Athenaeum's 32nd Annual Juried Exhibition will open online the first week of April. Artists may enter up to three individual works for juror consideration for this exhibition. Our juror this year is Armando Pulido, Writer and Curatorial Assistant, Lucas Museum of Narrative Art. Entry fee per artist is \$15 for members and \$20 for nonmembers.

In addition to his work at the Lucas Museum, Pulido is a regular contributor to Frieze magazine. He has reviewed exhibitions in Los Angeles that help to expand the social art history of contemporary art, such as the Made in L.A. Biennial and Painting in the River of Angels: Judy Baca and The Great Wall. His research has focused on art from the U.S.-Mexico borderlands, Mexican Muralism, and contemporary U.S. Latinx art. He has contributed to exhibition projects at the Hood Museum of Art at Dartmouth College and the Museum of Fine Arts, Houston and was recently a fellow of the AllPaper Seminar at the Benton Museum,

he held curatorial positions at the Whitney Museum of American Art.


